## **MOVIE CONTEXT**

*Coming Out: A 50 Year History* is a documentary in which high school and college students interview several older members of the LGBTQI+ community about how their identity impacted their lives. The interviewees' experiences span five decades as they recount a time when there was little acceptance of the LGBTQI+ community. They tell stories about the challenges of coming out, gay rights activism, family relations, and queer norms and culture. The documentary also shows how harsh attitudes toward the LGBTQI+ community have eased over time.

The documentary is narrated by the transgender teen, activist, and TV personality Jazz Jennings. The powerful imagery presented in the film serves as a backdrop to these individuals' stories.

#### **KEY VOCABULARY**

**Coming Out** – The acknowledgement of one's sexual or gender identity, either to oneself or publicly

AIDS (Acquired immune deficiency syndrome) - A life-disease of the immune system that plagued the American LGBTQI+ community in the 1980s.

**Tenderloin District** – A neighborhood in downtown San Francisco known for arts, theatre, restaurants, nightlife, and a robust LGBTQI+ community.

**The Ladder** – First nationally printed lesbian magazine starting in 1956

"Off the curbs, and into the streets" – A slogan referring to bystanders leaving the sidewalks (curbs) and joining gay rights protests in the streets.

- Why do you think the LGBTQI+ individuals in the film experienced discrimination?
- Was there any particular story or interviewee that stood out to you? Why?
- What were the key moments that sparked the American gay rights movement?
- How did Felicia's experience as transgender interviewee vary from the gay and lesbian experience?
- How have attitudes changed toward lesbian and gay individuals in the United States?
- How are members of the LGBTQI+ community treated in your country?
- LGBTQI+ rights are human rights. How can we help build an atmosphere of inclusion regardless of personal or religious views?
