Each year from September 15 to October 15, the United States celebrates National Hispanic Heritage Month. This annual celebration recognizes the achievements by Hispanic Americans who trace their roots to Spain, Mexico, and the Spanish-speaking nations of Central America, South America, and the Caribbean.
