Fourth of July for All

REPS Amy Smith joined the Office of American Spaces in January 2023 and shares her plans for an epic 4th of July in Washington, D.C. Please enjoy her (virtual) tour!

As summer officially begins, Independence Day looms large here in Washington, D.C. Crowds of hundreds of thousands flock downtown to experience the holiday in the nation's capital. I have been a D.C. area resident for many years, but this is my first one where I can take part as a spectator.

In my previous career as a military musician, the 4th of July was never a day off from work – in addition to fireworks, apple pie, and parades, outdoor band concerts are an essential part of the festivities. Even during the pandemic, the band could not escape the **1812 Overture**. Free from that obligation, this year, I have my sights set on some iconic holiday events in the D.C. area:

National Archives: Beginning at 10:00am, take a seat and enjoy a reading of the Declaration of Independence from the steps of its home at the archives, followed by the Independence Day parade.

Baseball: Nothing says summer quite like baseball, and the Washington Nationals host an annual Independence Day home game at 11:05am. This year, they will be taking on the Cincinnati Reds at Nationals Park. I'm looking forward to watching the President's Race during the fourth inning. Go Teddy!

Smithsonian Folklife Festival: This huge annual cultural event takes place over two weeks on the National Mall, including the 4th of July. Enjoy musical performances, traditional crafts, and educational events. At 2:30pm,

check out "<u>De Libertate: Songs of Freedom and Hope</u>", featuring four performing groups from Ukraine.

A Capitol Fourth: No D.C. 4th of July experience is complete without this PBS-sponsored musical event, complete with a spectacular fireworks display with the U.S. Capitol building serving as a backdrop.

This is an ambitious itinerary for one day, so if you would rather kick up your feet and take a well-deserved rest, I have good news! Each of these events is either livestreamed or televised, so everyone can enjoy a slice of D.C.'s Independence Day from the comfort of home.

Meet Altynai Arstanbekova, from the American Corner, Talas, Kyrgyzstan.



American Spaces Bring Connections for All



In April, two participants in *PY351, the American Spaces Tradecraft* course in Vienna, Austria, met and conceived of a joint program at their respective spaces. Adriana Alvarez from the ASICANA Binational Center in Santiago del Estero,

Argentina and Mariia Ocheretiana from America House Kyiv,

Ukraine shared ideas and possibilities in Vienna. Together with ASICANA Academic Director Katherine Carabajal, they organized the webinar "Youth Perspectives: Life in a Time of War" on May 31 for an audience of more than 70 Argentines (with more than 280 participants watching the recording later). The program built on the photo exhibit of Russia's war against Ukraine that is currently touring BNCs in Argentina, and it provided a glimpse into the lives of young people living through Russia's invasion of Ukraine. Did You Know?

Opportunity to Host Sustainability-Focused Programming The Department of State's Office of Global Partnerships has recently launched the Climate Solutions and Sustainable Entrepreneurship Fund. This funding opportunity will support expert entrepreneur-support organizations in order to drive sustainability-focused programming in partner organizations such as community centers, technology labs, makerspaces, and possibly American Spaces, in developing economies that strive to capacitate local entrepreneurs and increase their ability to scale climate solutions to market.

Entrepreneur-support organizations that apply to receive funding will be looking for partner organizations where they can implement the programming. We want to alert coordinators that you might be approached to use American Spaces as venues to implement projects.

If a particular American Space is interested and has capacity to host project implementers, we encourage this as a great opportunity to harness U.S. government funding to support policy-driven, economic-focused programming to benefit your local audiences and grow your institutional ties. It is up to each Space, consulting with your Public Affairs colleagues at your local embassy or consulate, to decide whether you have capacity to support, and up to the implementer to set out exactly what they would need from the American Space. We understand that the implementer receiving the grant would be responsible for all major organizing, presentations, supplies/equipment, etc., and that the American Space would provide the venue for the event to take place. Coordinators should contact their REPS with any questions or for help in engaging on such proposals, as needed.

If you have an existing relationship with an organization you think might be a good fit to apply for funding, please encourage them to apply!

Applications for the initial portion of the selection process (Statements of Interest) will be open until July 14.
