## American Spaces Conference 2023



The Office of American Spaces hosted its annual conference for REPS (Regional Public Engagement Specialists) and DC/Doha/Vienna based staff in Washington, D.C., during the last week of June. The **U.S. Copyright Office** recently announced a public webinar to take place on July 26, 2023, on international copyright issues arising from artificial intelligence (AI) technology.

On July 26, 2023, join the Copyright Office for a discussion on global perspectives on copyright and AI. Leading international experts will discuss how other countries are approaching copyright questions such as authorship, training, exceptions and limitations, and infringement. They will provide an overview of
