U.S. Culture

Representing the Land of Enchantment

Miquela Burke joined the Office of American Spaces as a Regional Public Engagement Specialist in Fall 2022. She previously served as in Tallinn, Estonia as an EPAP (Expanded Professional Associates Program) in public diplomacy, and in La Paz, Bolivia in American Citizen Services. In this month's lead story, Miquela shares about National Hispanic Heritage Month and her home state of New Mexico which is part of the American Southwest.

I couldn't help but laugh when, on a recent trip to Santa Fe, my husband pointed to a sticker at one of my favorite shops and whispered to my daughter, "Look, this one's about your mom." It read, "Hecho en Nuevo México." (English Translation: Made in New Mexico.) He's not wrong. My ancestors have been living in Northern New Mexico for centuries--Ortizes, Luceros, Quintanas, Senas. I love my home state and as a proud Hispanic, I'm particularly excited to sing its praises during <u>National Hispanic Heritage Month</u>, which runs September 15 to October 15 every year.

It's also fitting that the "Land of Enchantment" (as New Mexico is known) is especially magical in September and October. Why? Fall in the state is a feast for the senses. Imagine crisp mornings with mugs of piñon coffee, yellow aspen and cottonwood leaves against turquoise skies, and the <u>scent of</u> <u>roasting green chile in the air</u>. Combine all this with the annual festivals and seasonal events listed below and, in my opinion, you won't find a better time to learn what the 47th state is all about.

Fiestas de Santa Fe

New Mexico's capital city, Santa Fe, has been holding <u>Fiestas</u> since 1712. Originally an event commemorating the "peaceful" reconquest of the city by the Spanish over the local Pueblo people (the original indigenous inhabitants), it has transformed over the years to better reflect all of the state's cultures and peoples while locals continue to grapple with the area's history of colonization. The week-long festival begins with the burning of a giant puppet named <u>Zozobra</u> and includes parades, cultural performances, and an arts and crafts fair in the central plaza.

Balloon Fiesta

The International Balloon Fiesta in Albuquerque, the state's largest city, has been taking place since 1972. Once a fairly small affair, it is now the largest ballooning event in the world. Each year, hundreds of hot air balloons participate in mass ascensions from the 78-acre Balloon Fiesta Park. It's a stunning and absolutely unforgettable experience!

National Hispanic Cultural Center

The <u>National Hispanic Cultural Center</u> in Albuquerque offers a place for Hispanic, Chicano, and Latinx artists to share their work. A gigantic <u>fresco</u> by Santa Fe native and world-famous frescoist Fred Vigil charts the Hispanic experience on the center's walls and local performing arts companies, such as <u>Opera Southwest</u>, stage Hispano-centered productions like an opera based on New Mexican writer Rudolfo Anaya's *Bless Me*, *Ultima*.

I hope that everyone has the opportunity to experience New Mexican hospitality one day, but I also realize it's a long journey for the majority of our American Spaces community. Therefore, I'm sharing a recipe for the state's

official cookie, the <u>biscochito</u>, so you can get a taste of New Mexico wherever you are.

Notable music-related lessons include <u>Learning from Lyrics</u>, <u>Poetics of Hip-Hop</u>, and <u>Adapting a Musical</u>. <u>Digital resources</u> in their collection include videos and interactive media about American music.

The Rock and Roll Hall of Fame's educational site, <u>Rock Hall</u> <u>EDU</u>, includes music videos from prominent artists, curated playlists, research guides, powerpoints, infographics, <u>short</u> <u>guides</u>, and even a <u>core concepts</u> video collection where you can learn about music and social justice.

Countering Disinformation in Chile

The American Spaces in Chile hosted a U.S. Speaker, Luis Botello, as part of their strategic annual program on countering disinformation "Verifica Tus Medios" in mid-August. The American Space at Universidad Diego Portales engaged with university and high school students with a panel featuring Mr. Botello, and a Tech camp alumnus.

The **American Space Moneda** hosted a roundable with academics from schools of journalism. Besides Mr. Botello, an IVLP alumnus and the American Space Moneda coordinator participated in the panel.

Panelists highlighted the importance of free, independent, and credible media outlets, the importance of critical thinking, ethics in journalism and news literacy. Audience members asked questions of the panelists and were highly engaged by the discussion.

Lastly, Mr. Botello recorded an episode of the <u>American Spaces</u> on air podcast, where he shared his views on journalism and how the Fulbright scholarship largely influenced his professional trajectory. Listen to the podcast (recorded in Spanish) and share it with your American Spaces!

Last month, Associates of the American Foreign Service Worldwide (AAFSW) announced the recipients of the **2023** Secretary of State Award for Outstanding Volunteerism Abroad (SOSA). For the SCA Region, Alesia Krupenikava, EPAP for Public Affairs who works with American Spaces in Turkmenistan, along with her husband, Foreign Service Officer William "Ed" O'Bryan, were named co-recipients.

They helped break barriers for women and girls in Turkmenistan through their work with a global tech innovation nonprofit. Since 2022, more than 400 Turkmen girls have participated in the non-profit's programming, and two teams from Turkmenistan have progressed through a pool of 1,000 teams to reach the semifinals of the organization's global competition. The SOSA award winners will be honored at a ceremony later this year. Many congratulations to Alesia and Ed!


Did You Know?

Prevent Phishing Attempts

Department of State social media accounts are common targets for hackers and other malicious actors. Department social media managers must remain vigilant and take steps to decrease the likelihood of unauthorized access to official accounts.

Consider the following recent examples of phishing attempts directed at official Department of State Facebook pages:

 Meta will never communicate regarding page issues in your page's inbox: Multiple posts have flagged a suspicious message in their Facebook page's inbox. The message is from a profile named "Meta Business Suite." It states your business page has been disabled and includes a link. This is not an official communication from Meta. It is instead from a false profile named Meta Business Suite with a profile image of a Meta logo.



 Meta will never communicate that a Facebook page will be deactivated via a page notification: Other posts have reported a notification with a deceiving icon and name, implying that a page will be removed or has violated a Facebook policy.

simulated space conditions. Currently, she is featured on the show *Strange Evidence*.

Sam is the chief executive officer of Veracode, a computer application security company. She is responsible for company leadership and the creation of secure software for clients. Sam is a recognized expert in cybersecurity, the emerging practice of DevSecOps, managed vulnerability protection services, penetration testing, and on-demand security services.



Schedule Scott for <u>National Disability Employment Awareness</u> <u>Month</u> as well as accessible technology related programs. <u>Scott Kupferman</u> is an assistant professor at the <u>University of Colorado in Colorado Springs</u>. He also directs the National Collaborative for Disability and Technology, which works on increasing the availability of accessible technology for people with disabilities. Scott's expertise includes assistive technology, transition from secondary education to postsecondary education, employment, and independent living, and accessibility and universal design.
