

Fourth of July (Independence Day) Scavenger Hunt

It's **Independence Day** in the United States! This Fourth of July scavenger hunt will help you learn about Independence Day in the United States and improve your search skills on **eLibraryUSA**.

On July 4th, 1776, The Continental Congress formally adopted the Declaration of Independence, a key document in the history and government of the United States. The document was written by Thomas Jefferson, Benjamin Franklin, John Adams, Robert R. Livingston, and Roger Sherman. The Declaration of Independence formally announced the separation of the thirteen colonies from British rule and contained the famous line, "All Men are Created Equal."

In 1870, Congress passed a law establishing July 4th as a federal holiday to celebrate the 'birth of an independent nation.' At first, not all Americans celebrated the Fourth of July across the United States. Due to differences, mainly political opinions, some Americans did not celebrate the holiday until many years later. Today, July 4th is one of the most popular holidays in the United States.

Americans all over the world celebrate the "nation's birthday" with outdoor events, such as picnics, backyard barbecues, fireworks, and games. Groups of friends, neighbors, and family members, gather together in backyards, at the beach, at parks, and other open areas. Washington, D.C., the nation's



capital, hosts a televised celebration with musical performances in front of the Capitol Building on the National Mall.
